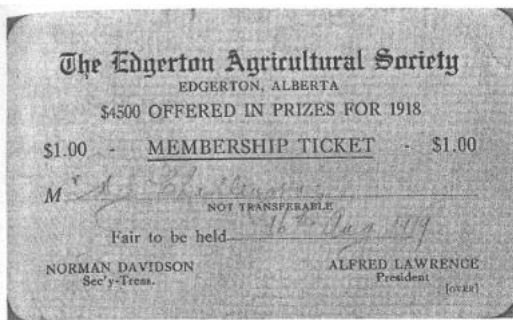

Celebrates 50 years



The first Edgerton Agricultural Society Fair was held in the summer of 1911, on the farm of Alf Challenger where Gordie and Eva Dorland live.

Later, 40 acres of land were purchased east of Edgerton. Here an open building was erected and suitable sheds build, to house the various exhibits.

At a later date the Edgerton Agricultural Society moved its location again. This time to south of Edgerton where the Sports Ground is situated. The main building a structure 20feet by 30 feet was moved to the new location by means of four wagons. After years of service it was torn down. Also after years of interesting fairs the Secretary of Edgerton Agricultural Society, Mr. N. Davidson, received a letter from H. Huxley, Sec. Treas. of The Alberta Agricultural Fair Society, on May 16 1924, giving the Edgerton Society a year's extension, to "pull themselves together and get the local society going again." This must have been done since fairs were held regularly until April 20, 1937 when a notice of Liquidation of the Edgerton Agricultural Society was received.

But, interest in agricultural affairs has been revitalized in Edgerton, for on Tuesday June 26, 1973, at 8:00 o'clock PM., thirty-five citizens attended a public meeting in the Legion Hut to discuss the feasibility of forming an Agricultural Society with the object of building a community hall.

To form such a society, Mr. Park, District Agriculturalist, guest speaker at that meeting, reported that a minimum of fifty members must be signed, at the lowest cost of \$1.00 per membership. Officers and directors were to be elected and appointed.

One hundred nineteen people bought memberships. And at a meeting on December 7th, 1973 in the Legion Hut, a slate of directors and executive were elected. A charter was applied for and received.

Since then two fairs have been conducted, and a building site for the hall purchased. Also, materials, plans and finances are on hand with which the Edgerton Community Hall will be erected.

General Information

THE EXHIBIT HALL CLASSES ARE LISTED IN THIS FAIR BOOK AND ALSO AVAILABLE ONLINE AT EDGERTONAGSOCIETY.COM

INTERPRETATION

1. "Judge" means the person(s) contracted by the Edgerton Agricultural Society to decide the placing at the Bench Fair.
2. "Exhibitor" means any owner signing an Entry Form and placing items in the Bench Fair to be judged.
3. The Edgerton Agricultural Society Bench Fair Conveners have the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and to determine all matters, questions or differences regarding this fair handbook.
4. Edgerton Agricultural Society Bench Fair Conveners have the right to amend or add to these Rules & Regulations from time to time.
5. Any Exhibitor who violates any of the rules and regulations printed in this Fair Book will forfeit all privileges and premiums upon the decision of management.
 - a. Prizes & awards
 - b. Prize money
 - c. Forfeiture of any or all passes or entry fees.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR ALL BENCH FAIR EXHIBITORS

1. All exhibitors are encouraged to obtain a Fair Entry number prior to bringing their entries to the Ag Hall. Entry numbers may be obtained in advance by contacting **Lara Matechuk at 780-806-9173**.
2. An entry form (located in the center of this book) is to be completed for each section entered by an exhibitor listing the categories entered in that section only. For Example: list only the category numbers entered in Horticulture on ONE entry form, then Baking on another.
3. Extra entry forms and tags for exhibits will be available at the Edgerton Village Office, Edgerton Foods, Waddell Home Hardware and Farmhouse DIY in Wainwright or at the time of registration
4. **All exhibits are to be taken to the Edgerton Ag Hall Thursday July 4th, 2024 between 6:30pm – 7:30pm OR Friday, July 5th, 2024 between 9:00am - 12:00pm. Please allow sufficient time for all your entries to be placed by 12pm (noon) Friday, July 5th. If you require alternate arrangements, contact Rita Fraser at 780-755-2325.**
5. Placement of the exhibits will be the responsibility of the Fair Committee.
6. All exhibitors must supply their own display containers.
7. DUE CARE WILL BE TAKEN TO PROTECT EXHIBITS AND CONTAINERS, BUT THE AG. SOCIETY & FAIR COMMITTEE CANNOT ACCEPT RESPONSIBILTIIY FOR LOSS OR DAMAGE.
8. Only judges and authorized persons to be present during judging.
9. Exhibitors are encouraged to be a member of the Agricultural Society, this is not requirement for participation in the Bench Fair. Children under 18 and living at home are covered by membership of either parent (Memberships can be obtained at the time of registration)

10. Category Entry fee: JUNIOR \$3.00
11. Category Entry Fee: SENIOR, OPEN HANDICRAFT, HOME BAKING, HORTICULTURE, VISUAL ARTS - \$5/category.
12. **ENTRIES SUBMITTED MUST BE THE WORK OF THE EXHIBITOR. EXHIBITORYS MUST BE AMATEURS. NO COMMERCIAL ENTRIES.**
13. Any exhibit winning a prize previously in the Edgerton Ag Fair is NOT eligible for competition.
14. No person will be allowed to enter more than one exhibit in any one class. A single item may be entered in one class only, but a set may be divided among multiple classes. A 'set' will be judged on a single item, sets are for display purposes only.
15. Exhibits will be on display Saturday, July 5th, 2024g from 9:00am to 6:00pm, and Sunday, July 6th, 2024 from 11:00am to 4:00pm. TROPHIES WILL BE AWARDED SUNDAY AT 4:00PM AT THE EDGERTON AGRICULTURAL HALL.
16. Exhibits must be picked up following the awarding of trophies on Sunday before 5:30pm. EXHIBITORS TAKING THEIR ARTICLES BEFORE CLOSE OF THE FAIR WILL FOREFIT THEIR PRIZE.
17. Committee members will not be responsible for exhibits after the close of the fair.
18. Prizes in all classes (unless otherwise noted: 1st - \$4, 2nd - \$3; 3rd - \$2. Trophy recipients will be awarded \$15 in lieu of trophy. Points are based on dollar value awarded in category.
19. Specials will be included in aggregate points. Aggregate points will be equal to the prize money given. Exceptions are noted in the book.

JUDGING

1. Judges are expected to familiarize themselves with all the rules and regulations of the Edgerton Bench Fair and to particularly note the rules of the classes they will judge.
2. In the absence of competition in any class, the judge will award such prize as he/she determines the exhibit deserves. They will exercise their discretion as to whether first, second or any prize will be awarded. Judges should not award prizes to unworthy exhibits.
3. If there is any question regarding the legitimacy of an entry or the right of an article to compete in any Section or Class, the judge shall report this to the Fair Conveners.
4. The decision of the section judge is final in all cases.

EXHIBITOR CONDUCT

1. Any exhibitor who interferes or shows disrespect to any judge or volunteer during the performance of thier duties while on the premises of the Edgerton Agricultural Society Hall shall be disqualified.
2. Upon discovery of any fraud, deception or dishonest practice, either in the preparation or ownership or of any misrepresentation concerning any article exhibited, which may have affected or have been intended to affect the decision of the judge(s), the Fair Conveners have the power to withhold prizes awarded.

All photographs are to be no larger than 12.5 cm x 17.5cm OR 5"x7" – unframed/unmounted

Bouquets to be shown in clear glass jars, with water, not vases.
Bouquets are not arrangements, they are displayed as held in hand when picked.
No foil on jars.

Ages 8 and under - Baking can be done by an adult, decorated by child.
All baking to be placed on disposable plate and sealed in a new zippered bag

School Lunch – must be packed in reusable containers. It will be judged on nutrition and appeal. Follow Canada's Food Guide.

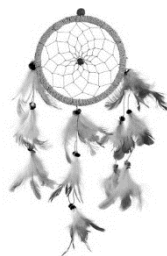

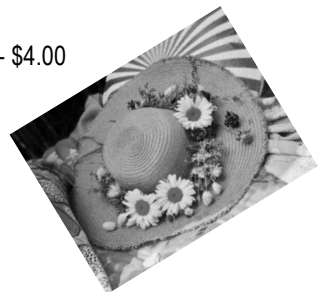

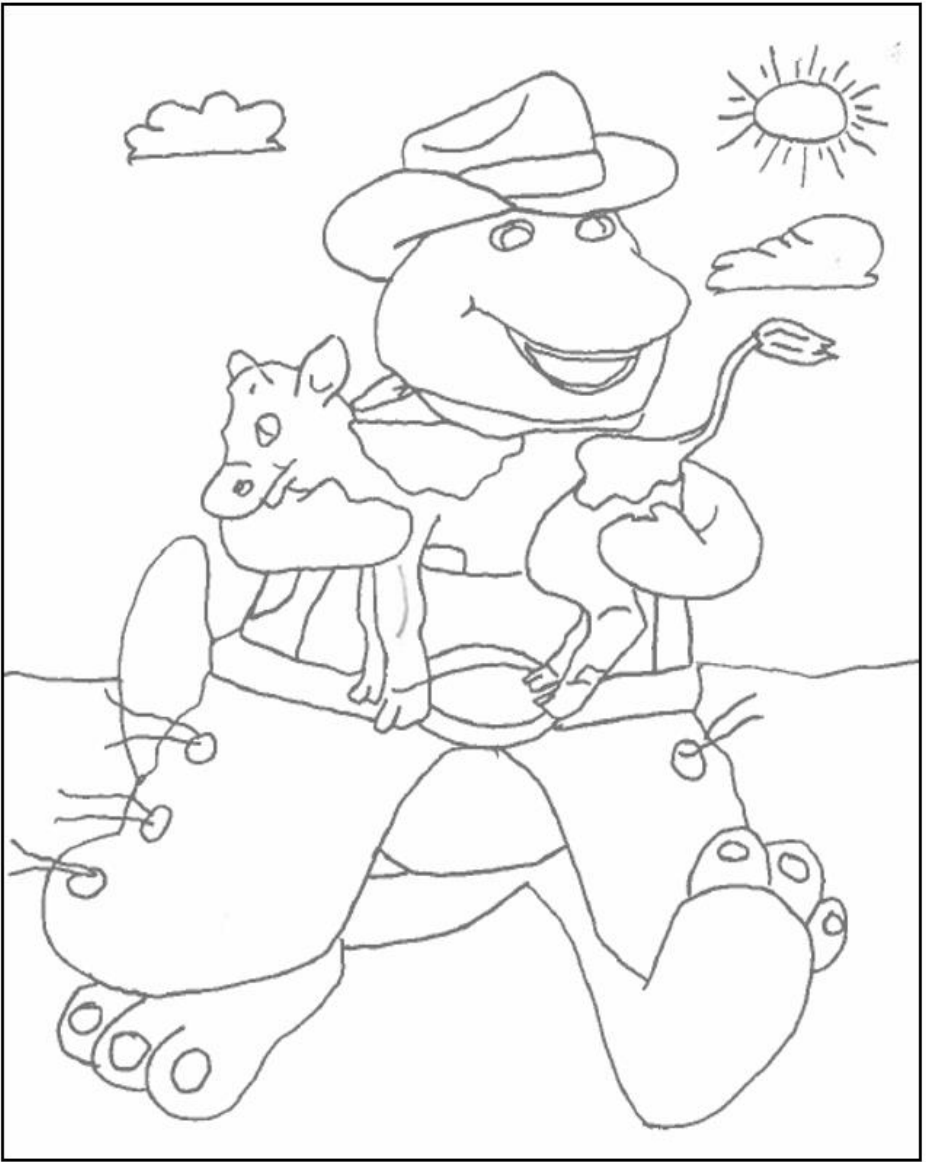
