General Information

THE EXHIBIT HALL CLASSES ARE LISTED IN THIS FAIR BOOK AND ALSO AVAILABLE ONLINE AT EDGERTONAGSOCIETY.COM

INTERPRETATION

1. "Judge" means the person(s) contracted by the Edgerton Agricultural Society to decide the placing at the Bench Fair.
2. "Exhibitor" means any owner signing an Entry Form and placing items in the Bench Fair to be judged.
3. The Edgerton Agricultural Society Bench Fair Conveners have the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and to determine all matters, questions or differences regarding this fair handbook.
4. Edgerton Agricultural Society Bench Fair Conveners have the right to amend or add to these Rules & Regulations from time to time.
 - a. Any Exhibitor who violates any of the rules and regulations printed in this Fair Book will forfeit all privileges and premiums upon the decision of management; this includes Prizes & awards, Prize money, Forfeiture of any or all passes or entry fees.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR ALL BENCH FAIR EXHIBITORS

1. All exhibitors are encouraged to obtain a Fair Entry number prior to bringing their entries to the Ag Hall. Entry numbers may be obtained in advance by contacting **Lara Matechuk at 780-806-9173**.
2. An entry form (located in the center of this book) is to be completed for each section entered by an exhibitor listing the categories entered in that section only. For Example: list only the category numbers entered in Horticulture on ONE entry form, then Baking on another.
3. Extra entry forms and tags for exhibits will be available at the Edgerton Village Office, Edgerton Foods and Waddell Home Hardware or at the time of registration
4. **Exhibits may be taken to the Edgerton Ag Hall Thursday July 2nd between 6:30pm – 7:30pm OR Friday, July 3rd between 9:00am - 12:00pm. Please allow sufficient time for all your entries to be placed by 12pm (noon) Friday, July 3rd. If you require alternate arrangements, contact Rita Fraser at 780-755-2325.**
5. Placement of the exhibits will be the responsibility of the Fair Committee.
6. All exhibitors must supply their own display containers.
7. DUE CARE WILL BE TAKEN TO PROTECT EXHIBITS AND CONTAINERS, BUT THE AG SOCIETY & FAIR COMMITTEE CANNOT ACCEPT RESPONSIBILITY FOR LOSS OR DAMAGE.
8. Only judges and authorized persons to be present during judging.
9. Exhibitors are encouraged to be a member of the Agricultural Society, this is not requirement for participation in the Bench Fair. Children under 18 and living at home are covered by membership of either parent (Memberships can be obtained at the time of registration)
10. **Category Entry fee: JUNIOR \$4.00**
11. Entry Fee: Senior, Open Handicraft, Home Baking, Horticulture, Visual Arts - \$5/category.
12. **ENTRIES SUBMITTED MUST BE THE WORK OF THE EXHIBITOR. EXHIBITORS MUST BE AMATEURS. NO COMMERCIAL ENTRIES.**
13. Any exhibit winning a prize previously in the Edgerton Ag Fair is NOT eligible for future entry/competition.
14. Exhibitors may only enter one exhibit per class; unless the class calls for a set.. A set may be split between multiple categories. A 'set' will be judged as a single item.
15. Exhibits will be on display Saturday, July 4th, from 9:00am to 6:00pm, and Sunday, July 5th from 11:00am to 1:00pm.

16. **TROPHIES WILL BE AWARDED SUNDAY AT 1:00PM AT THE EDGERTON AGRICULTURAL HALL.**
17. Exhibits must be picked up following the awarding of trophies on Sunday before 3:00pm. EXHIBITORS TAKING THEIR ARTICLES BEFORE CLOSE OF THE FAIR WILL FOREFIT THEIR PRIZE.
18. Committee members will not be responsible for exhibits after the close of the fair.
19. **Ribbon (stickers) will be awarded to 3rd in each category; prizes in Junior Classes : 1st - \$3, 2nd - \$2; 3rd - \$1; Open and Seniors will only go to Second Place.**
20. Trophy recipients will be awarded \$15 in lieu of trophy. Points are based on dollar value awarded in category.
21. Specials will be included in aggregate points. Aggregate points will be equal to the prize money given. Exceptions are noted in the book.

JUDGING

1. Judges are expected to familiarize themselves with all the rules and regulations of the Edgerton Bench Fair and to particularly note the rules of the classes they will judge.
2. In the absence of competition in any class, the judge will award such prize as he/she determines the exhibit deserves. They will exercise their discretion as to whether first, second or any prize will be awarded. Judges should not award prizes to unworthy exhibits.
3. If there is any question regarding the legitimacy of an entry or the right of an article to compete in any Section or Class, the judge shall report this to the Fair Conveners.
4. The decision of the section judge is final in all cases.

EXHIBITOR CONDUCT

1. Any exhibitor who interferes or shows disrespect to any judge or volunteer during the performance of their duties while on the premises of the Edgerton Agricultural Society Hall shall be disqualified.
2. Upon discovery of any fraud, deception or dishonest practice, either in the preparation or ownership or of any misrepresentation concerning any article exhibited, which may have affected or have been intended to affect the decision of the judge(s), the Fair Conveners have the power to withhold prizes awarded.



DEFINITIONS/CLARIFICATION

Altered Ground	A composite stitch, composed of two different stitches to create a new pattern.
Amigurumi	A project of crocheting an animal character.
Arrangements	Arrangements are more structured and arranged where each item sits and displayed in a vase.
Bouquet	displayed as held in hand when picked,
Cutwork	Portions of a the fabric are cut away and the resulting holes are reinforced with embroider or needle lace.
Digital Art	is any artwork that draws upon digital technology as an essential part of the creative process. It can encompass a wide range of techniques.
Drawn Thread	A technique that involves removing threads from the fabric and then working decorative stitches over the remaining threads.
Hand Quilted	All 3 quilt layers sewn together by hand.
Hardanger	A form of whitework embroidery, traditionally stitched with white thread on white even weave fabric
Long Arm Quilted	The 3 quilt layers sewn together by a long arm machine.
Tied Machine	spaced threads are passed through the layers of the quilt and tied into knots The 3 quilt layers are sewn together on a domestic machine – NOT a long arm.

Bouquets to be shown in clear glass jars, with water, Arrangements are shown in vases with water. No foil on jars.

Ages 8 and under - Baking can be done by an adult, decorated by child.
All baking to be placed on disposable plate and sealed in a new zippered bag

School Lunch – must be packed in reusable containers. It will be judged on nutrition and appeal. Follow Canada's Food Guide.

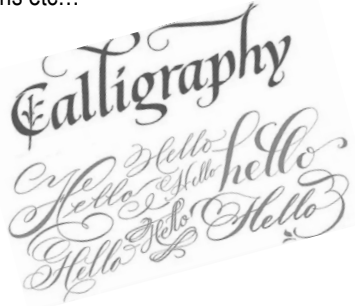

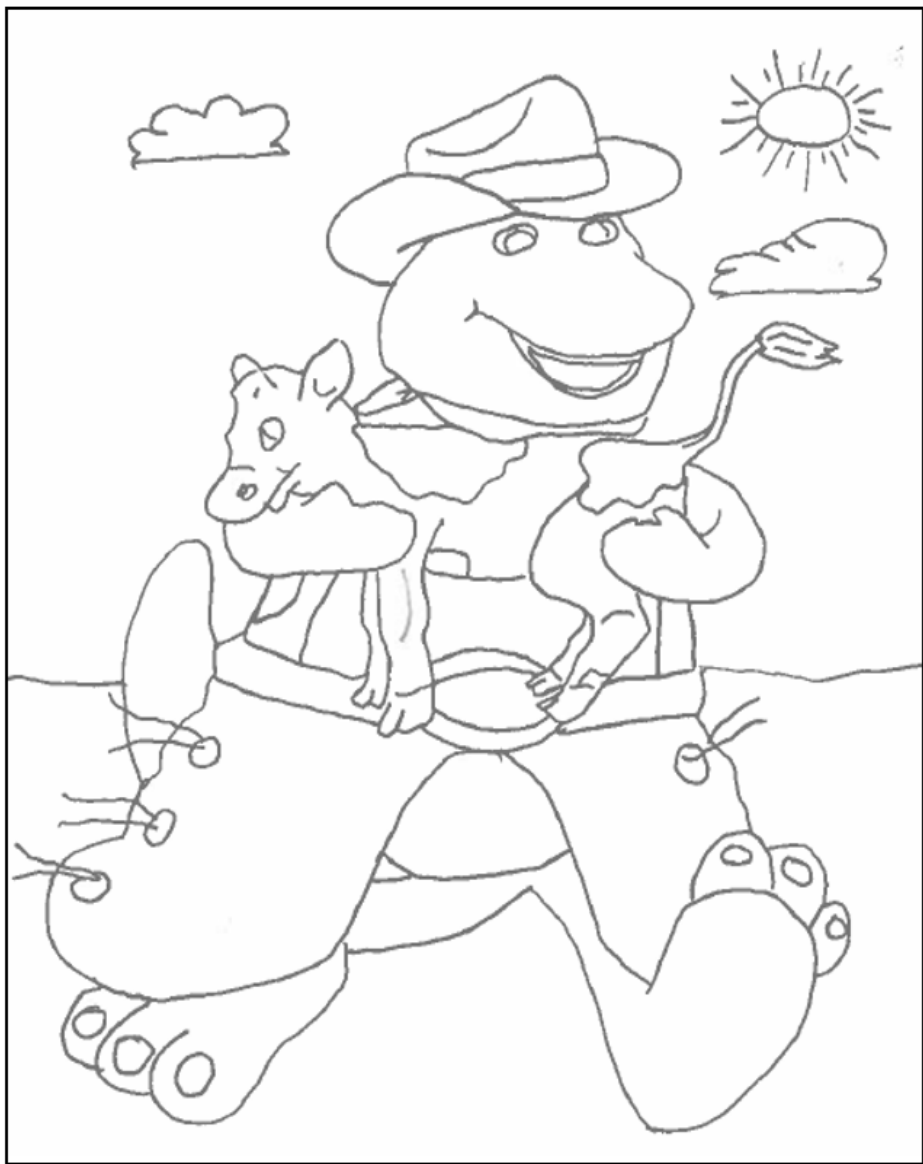
